MY USED VEHICLE, A WISE PURCHASE?

WARRANTIES



Manufacturer's warranty on new vehicles (basic or extended)
It is advisable to ask the manufacturer or a dealer if the warranty is still valid.



Legal warranty of good working order

This warranty, offered by merchants, varies depending upon the age of the vehicle and the vehicle's milage.



Legal warranty of normal use

Merchants must warrant that a vehicle can be used for a normal period of time in light of the price paid. This warranty applies even if there is no warranty of good working order or if it has expired.



Warranty against latent defects

Merchants must provide a warranty against latent defects.

This warranty can be limited if the purchase is made from an individual who indicates in the contract that the purchaser is purchasing the vehicle without a warranty ("at his own risk" or similar expressions).



Vendor's warranty or additional warranty

In addition to the legal warranties, a merchant who sells a used vehicle can offer a contractual warranty for which the merchant will be responsible. The merchant can also sell an additional warranty offered by an independent entity. Check for exclusions and conditions!

RIGHTS AND RECOURSES AFTER THE PURCHASE



If a problem arises, you should quickly send the vendor a demand letter asking the vendor to respect the warranties and repair the vehicle. If the vendor does not do so, you must institute proceedings in order to have the contract cancelled or your obligations as a purchaser reduced.



Under the Consumer Protection Act, merchants have several other obligations regarding the form and content of the contract as well as the manner in which they deal with consumers.
